

# CONGREGATIONAL HISTORY - 21ST CENTURY HERE WE COME! THIS IS WHERE WE HAVE BEEN.

As we approach the twenty-first century, we celebrate our heritage by looking at the past forty years that we have been known as Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church.

There will be names of some that we have forgotten, some who have died, some who have moved away and those who have joined us and will celebrate with us.

The congregation began with four families: The Reverend and Mrs. Robert Freistedt, Mr. and Mrs. Daniel White, Dr. and Mrs. Robert C. Bell Jr., and Mr. and Mrs. Lyle Christensen, who met at the Service of Ordination May 15, 1960 at St. Marks Lutheran Church in San Francisco for Pastor Freistedt, who was designated mission developer in Santa Rosa for the United Lutheran Church in America. Those on the steering committee were: Pastor Freistedt, Chairman; Robert Bell, Vice-Chairman; Jim Nelson, Treasurer; Eva Vaughan, Secretary; Helmut Klee, Lyle Christensen, and Dan White. Our congregation met at 1411 Carlos Court in Rincon Valley. The first service of our mission congregation took place October 16, 1960 at the Luther Burbank Art and Garden Center, our church for four years.

The "name the church" contest was won by Dan White, Helmut Klee, and Stephen Bell.

The first child baptized into our congregation was Terry Williams, November 6, 1960.



#### 21st CENTURY HERE WE COME 1961

"Faith Lutheran Taking Final Organization Steps", were the words in the local newspaper. It begins with the signing of the Charter by 70 adults and 10 confirmands. Little did we know that the roll would be open for signing until we built our first church in 1964. Our first service was held with 140 in attendance. Bethlehem choir sang. Lily Greer had returned from her trip to Europe to help Dorothy White with the music. I still miss Dorothy's "Oh, toot", when she would hit the wrong key. Our coffee time had been called a time when "the sweet aroma of fellowship fills the air. Stay a few moments after service and let us become acquainted with you.

The Board of American Missions of the United Lutheran Church in America purchased property on Highway 12 as a site to build our new church for \$49,000 (needless to say, it was not build there).

Confirmation classes were held on Saturday mornings, and the "Women of the Church" was organized. Ruth Bell was elected president.

On May 7 we had our Service of Organization. The Board of American Missions of the United Lutheran Church in America sent us a letter of congratulations, as did the other fellow churches. Dr. C.V. Tambert of the Southwest Synod gave the sermon and officiated at the installation of the church council. They were Dr. Robert C. Bell, Jr., Robert Bills, Roy Besser, Hjelmer Elvig, Helmut Klee, James Nelson, William Schmidt, Eva Vaughan, and Daniel White.



By this time Mrs. Allen Parson had joined the ranks of the musicians. The first confirmation class had the following members, Blythe Ailen (Babb), Billie Jean Block, Robert Bell III, Brian Compton, Eldred Compton, William Kent Davis Dennis Neiblas, and Stephen Robinson.

Pastor Freistedt and lay delegates, Mr. and Mrs. Daniel White attended the convention of the E.L.C. and we were officially accepted into the Southwest Synod.

Bill Schmidt headed our first stewardship program. Our choir was organized under the direction of Lily Greer. The young people started the Luther League Program which we now know as F.L.Y. We grow. We had our usual picnics, potlucks, social hours, and special films (no videos then). In August a two week VCS was held with 40 students and 10 teachers. There were always special services to celebrate church holidays.



We have another historical day in the life of our congregation with the election of our first fill term Council of Faith; President Robert Friestedt, Vice President Dr. Robert Bell, Jr., Roy Besser, Daniel White, Ray Allen, James Nelson, William Schmidt, Robert Bills, Allen Parson, and Lowell Thompson. H.N. Elvig was appointed Treasurer and Eva Vaughan Secretary.

In February, we started talking about a building fund. Eugene Heckathorn of the Lutheran Laymen's Movement came to explain the fund raising service. Later, Wilber Menke directed the publicity and fundraising program.

This description is applied to our congregation, "The church does not have a mission; it is a mission." These words were in our hearts and minds. Some people said, "Wait until we get a church building, then we will grow." If we do not reach out and bring others to Christ now, we will hardly do it when we have a building. We grow.

Mr. and Mrs. Allen Parson accompanied Pastor to the first annual convention of the Pacific Southwest Synod of the Lutheran Church in America. This marked the merger of four Lutheran bodies. Dr. Carl Segerhammer, formerly of the Augustana Church was elected president.

The Lutheran Church Women sewed new red cassocks and white surplices for the acolytes as well as making baptismal napkins.

Faith Parson was elected president of our congregation's Lutheran Church Women.

January had two special meetings for us as a congregation. The first one finalized the "new" church site at 4930 Newanga Ave. The second was to hire an architect to design our new church buildings. The firm of Blewet and McGowan of San Rafael was engaged to draw up the plans. We now needed a building committee which was chaired by Walter Brelje. The committee was composed of Dr. Robert Bell, Roy Besser, Mrs. James Nelson, Daniel White and Pastor Freistedt.

During the year the master plan of development was approved with hopes to start construction on the first units in early Spring of 1964

We celebrated Easter Sunrise Service at the site of our future church home. How exciting, the neighbor's roosters even crowed on cue. Our member, Barney Dross, constructed a wooden cross (which is now behind the alter under the oaks) for the service. Barney was a charter member, master carpenter, story teller, Santa Claus, handyman, helper, AA adviser, father and husband to Freida.

Sunday Church School gained in attendance. Don Christensen was named superintendent. The need then, as it is now, was for more teachers. A quote from Don's report, "When we get into our new church, the space problem will be taken care of" (Oh, how we wish).

Luther League was active with an average of 22 members. Kathy

Benedetti was their president.

We had a volunteer office staff with Eva Vaughan coordinating the ladies doing the secretarial work.

Our choir had twelve members under the direction of Lily Greer.

Dorothy White led the youth choir.

In June a "Fun and Fellowship" night was sponsored by the Lutheran Church Women. This was held at the church property for the congregation and friends. An oriental theme was used and we dressed for the occasion. A buffet dinner was served and the entire evening, including excellent entertainment, was considered a success.

There was rejoicing among the members when the Board of American Missions approved our architectural plans and returned them to us.

Our "Red Cottage" was known as the "Fellowship House" and also served as our church office. Many, many decisions and friends were made inside its walls.

The property report given by Chairman Roy Besser states that during the year several work parties were held to cut down the weeds and general clean-up of the site and Fellowship House. Two of the chicken houses were torn down and the use of a third chicken house has been planned for storage.

Late fall brought cold weather and also a plea from Lutheran World Relief for used clothing. We collected eighteen boxes and delivered them to the depot at Bethlehem Lutheran Church. Ray Allen was chairman for this event. The Lutheran Church Women sponsored gifts to be taken to Eldredge State Hospital for the mentally retarded in Glen Ellen. Mrs. Allen Parson was president for this term.

News Release

Sexagesima Sunday at Faith Lutheran will highlight the place of the laymen in the work of the church. There will be celebration of the Sacrament of Holy Communion and the installation of newly elected councilmen - Messrs, Don Christensen, Thomas Freeman, William Schmidt, Ray Allen, Elmer Burns, and Richard Sergaent together with the affirmation of the vows of the returning councilmen. The following were also installed: Dr. Robert Bell, President; Mr. Allen Parson, Vice President; Mrs. Sander Torgeson, Secretary; Mr. H. N. Elvig, Treasurer.

A big loss was when the White family moved in April They contributed so much to our existence. Replacing Dan White on the building committee was Tom Freeman.

In May, the day arrived for us to break ground for our new church buildings. We caravaned up to the church site following service at the Art and Garden Center on Yulupa. Dr. Anders Farstrup, regional secretary of the Board of American Missions was there for the dedication. We all had shovels in hand to help celebrate the occasion. Christensen and Foster, building contractors in Santa Rosa submitted the low bid of approximately \$63,000 and substantially completed construction in early October.

We had another Fun and Festival celebration and this time the theme was India. Mrs. Don Williams, President of the LCW, wrote in her report that the women had worked hard to make the aims of a year ago actual accomplishments. The LCW contributed both money and many hours of work on aitar paraments. Ruth Elvig did the couching on the white and green paraments and Donna Besser, Ruth Thompson, and Ruth Bell worked on the purple and red. "Christmons" for the holiday tree was another big project. The linens used on the altar were made by Mrs. Walter Vaughan. New bronze altar furnishing were purchased and the candlesticks are still being used today.


We have grown from four families to a membership of 154 confirmed members and a total of 240 baptized members. These were the figures in September of 1964 as we moved into our new church facilities. As we left the Art and Garden Center, members picked up items from the temporary worship service and moved them to the new church buildings in a car caravan. We have our first service in our own church. Dedication Sunday was October 11, 1964.

Pastor Freistedt resigned at the end of October as he felt the need to serve in some other area. He moved to San Diego and became a chaplain in the US Navy. Carl Berg became our interim pastor.

Our church is now established in our permanent home. We have all this room to grow. The beautiful oaks, and the surrounding pasture lands gives something special for us to enjoy and feel blessed. We thank God.

We start the year by welcoming the Rev. S. O. Thorlaksson, who replaced Pastor Berg. He will be our interim pastor until June, (the six months he was here he lived in the Red Cottage). He was a native of Finland and served as chaplain for the Bishop of Finland prior to moving to the United States. He spoke eleven languages. Pastor Toivo Harjumpaa was our guest speaker that day.

The council voted to have regular Lenten services beginning with Ash Wednesday and ending with Maunday Thursday. This was the first time we had Lenten services led by laymen. They were conducted by Art Lindberg, and Dr. Robert Bell. We are also having two services on Sunday mornings.

In March an official call was sent to the Rev, Elvin S Hansen to become our pastor. He accepted and was installed on June 27th. Pastor Hansen, his wife, Esther, three sons and a daughter moved into the parsonage. The felt the need for another bedroom and also be closer to the church, and so we sold the one in St Francis Acres for \$23,500 and purchased another at 2021 Woodward. They held an open house in early December for the entire congregation. Pastor Hansen writes in his annual report that, "The first six months have been interesting and exciting getting to know the congregation and it program and has been a pleasure, for I have found its people taking responsibility in a dedicated way to carry on the function of the church".

There are approximately 15 to 20 members in the choir under the leadership of Lily Greer. In December the council voted to look into the prospect of buying an organ. At present we are using a plane given to us to the White family.

Council president, Robert C. Bell, Jr., DDS writes that "Thanks should be given to the council (Ray Allen, Roy Besser, Donald Christensen, Walter Brelje, John Lundberg, Art Lindberg, Elmer Burns, Tom Freeman, Richard Pearson, Bill Schmidt, and Al Parson), the choir, pianists and organists, the church office secretaries, ushers, alter guild and acolytes, Sunday School teachers (Don Christensen, superintendent), and the Luther League (Sue Christensen [Woods], president. In addition we thank the Women of the Church who have responded every time they were asked and initiated programs that were of benefit to the church and the community (Mrs. Don Williams).

The Luther League had an interesting year, an ice cream social, swim parties, hosted a treasure hunt and a party with Bethlehem, and invited a speaker from the community. They also had a Tuesday night clean-up on the property (followed by a party), hosted a Seminary District Luther League Rally, had a Halloween Party with St. Marks, and ended the year by planning and building an outdoor manger scene and made it come alive for two nights with a live pageant of the Christmas Story. As if that were not enough, they went to San Francisco to sing Christmas Carols as they rode cable cars. Mr. and Mrs. Noel Barrie were their advisors.



1966

The highlight of the annual meeting was the passage of the motion to purchase an organ for \$4,300. Elected to council were Guy Coats, Hjelmer Elvig, Louis Faivre, and Richard Sergeant. A special gift from the Ed

Dermott Family made it possible to purchase choir robes.

"Dedication of the mural in the Fellowship Hall (now Hummon Hall) was held with a brief service. The lovely representation of the marching flags of the Reformation was taken from the bulletin cover for Reformation Sunday 1965. The original is a rendering of an idea proposed by the Fortress Press and painted by Davis Detzler. Permission was granted for its use as a mural. Our artists who saw the possibilities and completed the work are; Mrs. Robert C. Bell, Jr., Miss Judy Eng (Dick), and Mrs. Allen Parson. The mural measures 26 feet x 10 feet at its highest point and five feet at each end (from the April 17, 1966 Bulletin).

In May Art Lindberg went to the Annual Synod Meeting in Los Angeles

as lay delegate along with Pastor Hansen.

Our annual report shows records of growth and accomplishments. We had our first wedding, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Watson, newcomers to our church. The quality of our music under the direction of Lily Greer, choir director and organist, ably assisted at the organ and piano by Mrs. Al Parson and Miss Elaine Hansen adds inspiration to our worship.

Dr. Robert Bell served as president for a second term. Gladys Torgeson was secretary. Don Christensen was Sunday School Superintendent. There

are 83 students enrolled and 10 teachers.

The Worship and Music committee was headed by Lucille Smith. She wrote that the first responsibility was to insure that the services of God's house have been conducted properly and in accordance with the liturgy of the church. This is no problem as the services are always conducted in a proper manner.

LCW had a busy year helping to staff the Protestant Community Center twice a month besides gathering food for the shelter. The nursery in the Red Cottage was painted. A box of hand rolled bandages was sent to Tanzania. For the fourth year we held a "Fun and Festival", this time with a Hawaiian theme. The women made tray favors for the convalescent hospital and mailed Christmas packages to the young men in service. Mrs.

Thomas Freeman was president.

The Luther League was also active with Elaine Hansen, president. In reading over the report that they gave there was bowling with the Jewish youth group, followed by fellowship time, to Berkeley for Spring Rally, trips to the ocean and river, camp-outs at Armstrong Woods, a progressive dinner having many surprises, including "platter-chatter" with banana splits at the last stop, the Emmels. In October there was a "Halloween Spook House (I think that was held in the old chicken house). Another live pageant and caroling at the end of the year. Elaine writes that not all was fun and play for the Leaguers. They harvested the walnuts and sold them to the church members at well below market price to net about \$40.00. Our program is fun, study and service.

#### 1967

"NEW LIFE", the theme for Lutherans in the 450th anniversary year. We proclaimed it at the Sonoma County Fair where we had a stall. The portrait of Luther nailing the theses on the door at Wittenberg was drawn by Ruth Bell and painted by Judy Eng (Dick), and it served as a backdrop. Information about Lutheran Churches was handed out. At the banquet, the inspirational address was given by Dr. Paul Empe, General Secretary for the USA National Committee of the Lutheran World Federation. We heard music from the all Lutheran Choir and the Santa Rosa Symphony played the Reformation Symphony. It marked a first in a unified and ecumenical witness by all Lutheran Churches working together in local matters. Pastor Elvin Hansen who was president of the council expressed appreciation to Dr. Robert Bell who served as chairman of the committee.

Elected to Council were Mrs. Ed Dermott (many of the Christmas programs were directed by her), Mr. Dave Chance (built the large storage cabinets in Hummon Hall that we used for many years), Mr. Moss and Elmer Burns (who served as Sunday School superintendent, treasurer, head of ushering committee, and stewardship chairman).

Marianne Burns served as LCW president. Our Fun and Fellowship festival was held in June with a Latin American theme. We made blankets and rolled bandages for Lutheran World Relief. We made cookies and wrapped gifts for our servicemen. Some of our programs had guest speakers, others featured films or studies.

Luther League was lead by Greg Bean. The young people participated in Youth Sunday, Seminary District Rallies, camp-outs 450th Anniversary Rally at St. Lukes Church, Christmas Pageant, and Caroling in San Francisco.



Charter members and early members of Faith Lutheran Church are both shocked and deeply saddened to learn of the sudden passing of Mr. Daniel H. White. He and his family were instrumental in making the first contact with The United Lutheran Church in America to draw out their interest in establishing a mission in Santa Rosa which became Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church. He was a strong leader, serving the church wherever there was a need. He was on a business trip to the west coast from Milwaukee. He passed away last Thursday in Denver enroute home. He stopped in Santa Rosa briefly last week. Our prayers of sympathy and consolation are extended in behalf of his family at this time

#### From March 24, 1968 Bulletin

In his memory we established the Daniel H. White Memorial Garden. The dedication was September 1st. Dan's Wife Dorothy attended. Dr. Robert C. Bell, Jr. gave the tribute. The dedication was given by The Rev. A Everett Nielson, assistant to the President of the Pacific Southwest Synod.

Our January bulletin tells of our first "folk music", introduced at our 8:30 AM service, which brought a fresh approach, the kind being experimented with in many parts of the country and by many churches.

A mother-daughter luncheon was held and the committee consisted of Donna Besser, Shirley Williams, Esther Christensen, Marianne Burns, and Ruth Thompson. Their names may not have been mentioned often in these reports but they were always there when needed.

Newly elected members of the church council were Mrs. Doris Hix, Mrs. Mildred Linden, Mr. Don Christensen, and Mr. Thomas Freeman.

In August, the congregation honored Pastor and Mrs. Hansen on their 25th wedding anniversary with a dinner party.

Our hearts were saddened by the death of charter member Fred Moneymaker.

After many years as Sunday School Superintendent, Don Christensen retired and was succeeded by Elmer Burns. After serving six years as chairman of the alter committee, Ruth Elvig asked to be relieved of those duties. Her successor was Donna Besser. Esther Christensen replaced Doris Hix as director of acolytes and Betty Freeman took over the responsibility of Memorial Fund Secretary. Elmer Burns continued as head usher. Judy Lindberg has taken care of the nursery scheduling for many years. She was also our delegate to synod convention.


Throughout the year, the LCW made pajamas for the children of Vietnam, quilt blankets for Asia, and bandages made from old sheets for Africa.

The LCW also had charge of the coffee hour after church. Another project was the baking and packaging of cookies the first of every month for wounded servicemen returning to Travis Air Force Base. At Christmas time


tray favors were made and given to four rest homes. A busy year, but still time for "Fun and Festival", Japanese style. Marianne Burns was president.

If you think the LCW had a busy year, read the activities of the Luther League, which included, presenting the folk service, speakers, a hike to the top of Sugar Loaf Mountain, attending district rallies, helping at Vacation Bible School, a "short" fifteen mile hike, followed by dinner at the Emmels. Three hours and 76 tacos later they had 27 fat Leaguers. There was baseball, a bike safari for the younger members of the congregation, harvesting of walnuts (200 lbs), a mini rally at Fort Bragg. There's more with Halloween, Thanksgiving, and Christmas events. Debbie Faivre served as president. After all that, the sponsors must have been tired. I know I am.





WORKING ON THE DAN WHITE MEMORIAL GARDEN 1968



The year started with the Youth of the Church handling the folk service. At the annual meeting Dr. Robert Bell and Mr. Roy Besser were reelected to council, along with Mr. Charles Hammond, and Mr. Harold Sorensen. Don Christensen was president. Mildred Linden was our delegate to synod convention.

LCW was busy with its Bible studies, projects and gifts to Lutheran World Relief and Lutheran Social Services. The ladies also helped at the Rescue Mission. There was a trip to Berkeley for a tour of the Pacific Seminary and the wonderful view of the Bay Area--what sights to see. We continued our work for the Vietnam servicemen. Mother-daughter luncheon, and the "Fun and Festival" were special functions for the congregation. Lily Greer was our delegate to the LCW Convention at Asilomar. Esther Hansen served as our president

Please note that for some years the Sunday School Classes have given school supplies to the Rocky Boy Indian Mission at Box Elder, Mostana.

The "Couples Club" has also met for a number of years. Mr. and Mrs. Rich Pearson were the first to organize it. This afforded a social time for us and was usually a potluck with the host providing the entree. Entertainment could be slide shows given by our travelers, games, story tellers, semiprofessional dancers, sing alongs, or just good conversation. We knew one another and we were family. There were times we had service projects, such as one evening repairing toys at Welfare League's "Christmes Unlimited", and trimming the tree and decorating the church for Christmes.

Bob Sergeant led the Luther League this year with its many activities, spaghetti feeds, camp-outs, trips to the anew country, swim parties, folk service "Rejoice", Sunrise Service at Mr. Gileed, Trips to San Prencisco, live nativity scene, etc. etc. etc.

Mr. Charles Christian was appointed to Coucil to fill the unexpired term of Kris Dermott. Mr. Robert Duncan replaced Mr. Harold Sorensen.

In December Pastor Hansen submitted his resignation to accept a call at St. Marks Church in San Fernando. He writes in the annual report, "I close this report with words of deepest personal thanks for the kindliness and cordiality you have extended to us all through the years we have been in Santa Rosa. Our prayers will always rise in your behalf." Signed, Elvin S Hansen, Pastor. The council accepted with regret the resignation of Pastor Hansen.



Again we find ourselves without a pastor, but the work of the church goes on. Thank goodness, we have competent lay people and interim pastors, Ed Hummon, and John Zeltin. The church calendar continues along the same lines.

In April Mr. George Falk accepted our call. He was ordained on June 14 in Concord. Several families from our congregation attended Pastor Falk's ordination. He was installed on the 21st of June. A reception followed for The Reverend Falk, his wife Ethel, and their four children, Patricia, Cynthia, George, and Katherine. Fortunately our parsonage was large enough for them.

New things were happening. The contemporary Service of Worship and Celebration was introduced and became our regular service at 8:30 AM

A newly-organized parent cooperative nursery was started for children in the three year old group. This was not run by our congregation.

The Reverend Edward Hummon (retired) and his wife Mildred joined our congregation. God knew we needed him.

In September, the Council went on retreat to write a "Statement of Purpose" (one of many) for our church.

Our hearts were saddened by the death of Thomas Kjeldgard.

The Alter Guild seems to do its work quietly, behind the scenes. Those that prepare the altar for Sunday worship services are Emma Chance, Edith Ricker, Esther Christensen, Dee Pearson, Elaine Finger, Mildred Hummon, Sandra Wilkening, Ethel Falk, and Donna Besser. Some have done this for years.

There is always something to do on the property, re-staining the buildings, picnic tables, repainting parking strips, and refinishing doors. You should have seen the look on some of the faces when they saw the blue doors. Arrangements were made with a neighbor to use the back acreage for his livestock. This solved our weed problem in that area. The youth group erected a basketball hoop for its own use and for the benefit of the neighborhood.

With no paid janitor, it was up to the congregation to keep the buildings

clean. We have done so with our parish care groups.

The LCW continued to have their regular activities, Bible studies, hosting receptions, etc. Besides the Mother/ Daughter Luncheon this year, the LCW prepared a banquet for a Father/Son Evening. Dr. George Rostel showed his abilities as a magician. Esther Christensen was elected delegate to Asilomar. After two years of baking cookies for our servicemen it (fortunately) was time to stop. Yvonne Hudson had charge of collecting and packaging these boxes, an probably baked dozens. Doris Hix was president.

Carol Parson (Sergeant) headed the Luther League program Ice skating and a ski trip to Boreal started off the year. Later there was a swim party and a return to get some of Mrs. Emmel's "famous" tacos, plus kite flying, and camp-outs Sounds like fun time. A "kidnapping party" welcomed the Falk kids. Not all was fun and games. The youth found that a car wash was a very successful undertaking. The money earned went to defray some of the church organ's repair costs. In the Fall a new set of guidelines were drawn up. The former Luther League is now referred to FAITH YOUTH! Year's end found them caroling, partying, and presenting the traditional nativity scene. Carol Parson (Sergeant) was their leader.

TAX.

1971 marks a special time as this year we celebrate our 10th anniversary of organization. We will write more about this later.

Pastor Falk writes in his annual report, "It is most gratifying to detect the struggles and frustrations of some committees and the church council. They are to be commended for their dedication and personal stewardship. In the future a broader base must be sought among the membership. The standing committee structure should be continuously evaluated for a possible re-alignment and/or reorganization".

Good news was that for the first time in our history we realized a record Income, enabled us to eliminate seeking salary aid funds from the Board of American Missions. 100% of our accepted benevolence was reached, as well as giving considerable amounts to other causes during the year. Newly elected council members for 1971 were Mr. Richard Hays, Mr. Gary Wilkening, Mr. Russell Letherman and Mr. Ron Hudson. Mr. Roy Besser served as president of the congregation.

Parish night was instituted for all committees to meet on the same night, at which all programs and plans for the church were initiated and presented to Council.

Among the requests that the Worship and Music Committee made in 1971 was that girls be allowed to participate as acolytes with the approval of Pastor.

It should be noted that we have continued through the last couple of years to make donations to the Blood Bank for the use of our members when needed.

Lutheran Church Women grew in its active membership. For the first time program leaders presented their agendas to both circles which proved to be quite successful. The programs ranged through: book review, a lesson in church architecture, symbols and liturgies, travel slides of the Holy Land, studies In the "Miracle", current topics and a "Soul Food" dinner with real soul food. That evening was shared with the ladies of St. Marks. A one day retreat was held at White Sulfur Springs at St Helena. The theme was "Quest of the Best".



Our annual meeting did not open with a bang, just the usual reports, minor changes in our constitution, and the election of council members. Mr. Richard Sackett was elected and Mr. Roy Besser, Mr. Don Christensen, and Mr. Charles Hammond were reelected.

The following is quoted from the Link, "We sought a goal of \$1,000 from twenty people to relieve our interest indebtedness to the Board of American Missions. WE REACHED OUR GOAL OF TWENTY TERRIFIC SAINTS, but fell short of the Financial Goal by 20%. We received \$800 in Piedge Now--and will submit this amount. OUR CUP IS RUNNING OVER!!!"

The Church Council approved a new program for the Worship Life of our congregation by the formation of a group headed by Art Lindberg Initially he and two other members, Lowell Thompson and Larry Spielman will be assisting the pastor with the liturgy on Sunday mornings. Our "Celebrate" calls for some portions to use assistants.

Several girl volunteers were added to the acolyte list (another first). Our Baptismal Font Cover was presented to the congregation by the Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Ed Hummon and dedicated to the Glory of the Almighty God and in honor of their grandson, Sean H. Dennis. The cover was sculpted by Mrs. Robert C. Bell, Jr., and is a gift of love given in gratitude to the Lord and His Church.

Mr. Hilmer Elvig quietly performed many duties within the church, making certain our constitution read correctly, by taking on the Synod when he felt that its version was incorrect and not legal. Later Synod agreed with him and reworked its recommended form. This happened when we first organized. He served as usher, treasurer, and full time member of our property committee. One humorous sight was that of Hilmer supervising the burning of remnants of one of our chicken coops. The fire was a tad larger that he expected. Even though he was there with hose at the ready, it was of little value because the well was not providing enough water to produce more than a trickle. With the flames shooting skyward he

never left his post. It was a glorious sight. He and his wife, Ruth grew the most beautiful gladiolas, which they shared with us by providing flowers for our altar.

Gary Wilkening heads the Social Ministry Committee. Two hundred and twenty-five pounds of clothing were collected for Lutheran World Relief. Twelve pints of blood were donated in 1972 making 41 pints in the church account at the Blood Bank.

As Finance Committee Chairman, Jim Kensinger met with President Roy Besser and Pastor Falk to develop a better "form" of reporting to the church council the actual income and expenses as they relate to the budget.

The church services were changed to 9:00 AM and 11:00 AM.


"The Sunday School got underway with what appears to be a good schedule. Nursery, kindergarten, 1st, 2nd, 8th grades meet at 9:30 AM Third, 4th, 5th, 6th, and 7th grades meet at 11:AM All of the students meet in the church for the opening worship and hear a short children's sermon, which has become very popular with the adults as well as the students." This was a partial report from Howard Finger, School Superintendent.

The Women of Faith (LCW) met regularly and continued hosting the Mother/Daughter Luncheon and the Father/Son Barbecue, an Ice Cream Social to end with a Salad Luncheon and swim party. Their projects included gathering materials for Klenli-Kits (personal care) and Activiti-Kits. Bandages were rolled and mailed (for a leper colony in Africa), material squares were sent to an Indian Mission and donations made to the Board of American Missions. For our church, two acolytes albs were purchased and sewn. A chair cart was purchased and masks were made for the Sunday School Christmas Program. Two coffee pots and a table cloth were purchased using Betty Crocker coupons. (Please note that the ladies have purchased silverware, candlesticks plus other items through the use of these coupons). Many women also donated items through a "kitchen shower" for our church use. Esther Christensen served as president.

Faith Youth had a car wash, a spaghetti dinner, and a sale of walnuts to help finance the support of a foster child living overseas. Once a month they meet with St. Marks youth to share activities. President Randy Finger said there was a snow trip, the annual camp-out, decorating London House Convalescent Hospital for Christmas, plus caroling and a party.

The year ended with a special Christmas music program arranged by choir director, Lily Greer. Organists were Barbara Anderson and Faith Parson.

In November Pastor Falk announced to the congregation that he had accepted a call to Lord of Life Lutheran near Houston, Texas. His last day with this parish was December 29, 1972



Once again we start the year without a pastor. Fortunately for our members, we had a fellow member, Dr. Edward Hummon, Ret., that provided care on behalf of the Vice-Pastor Kenneth Stenmon, named by Synod. Roy Besser was elected Council President. The Council approved placing a one inch ad in the Press Democrat to advertise our church services. Elmer Burns retired as church treasurer. For years, Elmer has served this congregation as Head Usher, Sunday School Superintendent, Treasurer and Councilman.

The Vietnam War ended. Dr. Hummon lead a special prayer service on Saturday, February 27th at 4:00 PM, the time coordinated with the signing of the peace agreement. The phones were ringing to call our members and friends to this special moment in history. So many came on such short notice.

Lutheran youth were busy this year, adopting a girl at an orphanage in the Philippines, having a garage sale, snow trip, camp outs, swim parties, and sending six of their members to a youth gathering along with their leaders, Howard and Elaine Finger in Houston, Texas. There was caroling, visiting London house, on several occasions, harvesting and selling walnuts to cover some of their expenses.

In April our congregation sent letters to the National Aeronautics and Space Administration supporting the astronaut's reading the Bible from their space craft and to support the right of every human being to express his faith on God and the Bible publicity without fear of censure.

Pastor Lorents J. Flak was called to become the new Pastor of Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church. He will assume that position in June. The parsonage will be sold because Pastor and Mrs. Flak desire to purchase their own residence. The Flak's have two children, Beth and Jon.

On July 24th, our beloved Dr. Hummon died after a short illness. In his honor, Hummon Hall was named. A funeral pall that was purchased with Memorial Fund money was dedicated. Dr. Hummon served as a pastor in Illinois, Colorado, and Washington prior to moving to Santa Rosa, California. He was a teacher, counselor, pastor but most of all, he was our friend. His wife Mildred lives in San Rafael and worships with us occasionally.

A new logo has been adopted to be used on our church stationary, Pastor's calling cards, and in our church ad. This symbol was designed by Ruth Bell.

Janet Hammond reported for the Social Ministry committee that approximately 100 pounds of clothing, and blankets were sent to Lutheran World Relief. The account


at the Blood Bank continues to grow. \$120 were given to Santa Rosa Community Ministries.

The Faith Lutheran Church Women had a busy year. Rolled bandages were still needed. They created three banners, did some necessary house cleaning in the kitchen and Red Cottage. #### THE REVEREND EDWARD E. HUMMON DD 1906 - 1973

In a short period of time one man had a profound effect upon our congregation. Dr. Hummon, a servant of Christ, a member of Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church, gave us an example, he gave himself. As Albert Schweitzer said, "Example is not the main thing in influencing others: it is the only thing.

We loved his example. The tears that were shed were shed for us, we realize our loss. Now we can strive to be like him in our service to Christ's Church.

Dr. Hummon, we thank God for him.

He died at Memorial Hospital in Santa Rosa July 24, 1973. The funeral service was held at Faith Lutheran Church.

Another busy year. Roy Besser remains as president of the council. Newly elected members are Blaine Delvaux, Marianne Burns and Mary Cavallero.

Easter time was special because 23 youth members participated in a Good Friday interpretive drama, "Were You There", directed by Jean Flak.

It should be noted that Mildred Linden has given her time and talent to typing and mimeographing much of the information, bulletins, and newsletters that come out of the office, which is located in the Red Cottage.

The Executive Board reports that we show a steady growth in membership. All current bills, including the mortgage are paid. Our benevolence gifted to Synod were over and above our pledge this year. It made us proud to be members of Faith Lutheran Church.

Greg Dahlquist was president of the youth group. They continued their activities as in the past years plus having an agape feast for the congregation and collected money for "Flower of the Dragon" which helped returning veterans.

Our "church library" was moved from Hummon Hall to "The Fireside Room" in the Red Cottage.


Vacation Church School fro 1974 was very successful. Almost every member of the congregation was in some way involved in the program. This must have been some kind of record.

Donna Besser of the Worship and Music Committee writes that the first contemporary service was held April 21 at 11AM. We are very appreciative of the musicians who practice once a week to accompany the service. This service has changed the "church going habits" of some of our members, but our church continues to grow and reach out to many different people. Donna also mentioned in her report that the highlight of the holiday season was the beautiful Christmas Cantata, "Night of Miracles", presented at both services. Lily Greer, Barbara Leach, and Faith Parson are faithful and talented members who serve by playing the organ. Many others are always in the background, serving. Ruth Elvig, who schedules the greeters, Esther Christensen who schedules the acolytes and Betty Freeman who was in charge of the Memorial Fund.

Our lath house was turned into a meditation corner. Faith Parson created the "Prayer of St. Francis" wall board.

The recording of the year was "Song of Mystery" and Joy Breaking Out" sung by Pastor Flak and produced by Dr. R. C. Bell, Jr.

The Hammonds and the Fingers and their helpers provided a delicious Thanksgiving feast which they planned, cooked, and served for us to enjoy. They made \$24 profit which went to the Hunger Appeal Bank and we had a wonderful dinner.



Once again we, as a congregation, surpassed our Benevolence goal to Synod. We feel this is significant because of the overall success of the Stewardship Program. It also shows that as a congregation, we have placed our concern for others above that of our own.

Howard Finger was elected president of the congregation. Newly elected council members were Jerry Dahlquist, Glenn Johnston, Al Parson and Russ Letherman.

At the annual meeting, Pastor Flak reported that the average attendance for the contemporary service was 73.5 and 76.1 for the traditional service. A guest speaker was The Reverend Carl W. Segerhammer, President of the Pacific Southwest Synod. Since he is retiring, this was his last official visit to this area.

Faith Lutheran sponsored a softball team, coordinated by Gary and Jim Wilkening. Fortunately the game was for fun and not for win time.

President A-Besser wrote that the church youth held a "Hunger Fast" starting after a congregational dinner. This was a marathon for those participating and sponsors were needed. All money collected was given to the World Hunger Fund. In June, Faith youth held an Ice Cream Social. They gave a Christmas Party for a ward at Sonoma State Hospital (about 50 women). All was not work. They had their backpacking trip, bike riding in Golden Gate Park, snow trips dances and parties. They still had time to harvest wainuts.

We also saved nylons, Betty Crocker coupons (for silverware) and donated Blue Chip Stamps for kitchen items. Lucille Smith headed the LCW for 1975.

The Hammonds and the Fingers again hosted a Thanksgiving dinner for the congregation, this time with the help of the Roy Emmels. All moneys over the actual costs went to "The Flower of the Dragon".

Once again we were privileged to hear :Night of Miracles". Jeanine Dahiquist sang the soprano solo; Marianne Wilson, alto; tenor solo by Don Williams; Pastor Flak, baritone solo. Dr. Robert Bell Jr. was the narrator. What a great way to celebrate the Christmas Holiday and end another year.

Our first woman to be elected Council President Marianne Burns, who presided over the annual meeting. Newly elected council members were Judy Bello, Will gritter, Mike Lee and Pat Haug. Vice-president, Russell Letherman gave a brief description of "Parish Nights" and listed the responsibilities of its seven committees.

It should be noted that we continue to exceed our benevolence goal.

This was the year that we started our Social Ministry Program of the third Sunday of the month and presented to the congregation the various needs of the community.

Housekeeping crews (eight in all) kept the church buildings clean. Roy Emmel kept the lawns mowed. The entire congregation worked at the annual Spring cleanup.

The choir and the contemporary group made a joyful noise when they visited the Village Baptist Church in Marin City. This was in return for their choir presenting two concerts at our church.

Jeff Dahlquist headed the youth group. Sponsors were Val Peterson and Janet and Chuck Hammond. There were many fun activities, campouts, bike rides, and a snow trip, but also there were visits to Sonoma State Hospital. Christmas Caroling, church services and earning money for their projects.


This year the church women organized their third circle, Lydia. Anna and Rebeka were started during the first year of organization.

Bells were rung following an outdoor worship service on July 4th to celebrate a nationwide observance of the 200th anniversary of the founding of our country.



1977

He and Ruth gave many hours, days, and years to further the growth of Faith. Our council President, Will Gritter wrote in his report that the most tangible evidence of our progress was to be seen in the increased participation of our members.

Val Peterson was added to out list of organist, that included Barbara Leach, Faith Parson, and Lily Greer. We are fortunate to have these talented people as a part of our church family.

Confirmation classes were changed from a two year program to a three year program so it would give more time to teach all of the material needed. Lani Thompson reported that 80 students were enrolled in church school with an average attendance of 48.

Believe it or not the Altar Guild used to make all those palm crosses that we give out on Easter Sunday.

F.L.Y. (Faith Lutheran Youth) painted the Red Barn (yes, we had a barn/cnicken coop) that we used for storage and a Halloween spook house. President Terry Finger wrote that it was an active year with campouts, snow trips, regular visits to Sonoma State Hospital and participating in church activities.

Fifteen ladies attended the Pacific Southwest Synod L.C.W. convention at Asilomar. Throughout the year the ladies were busy with activities ranging from making tray flowers and knitting slippers to hosting Mother-Daughter luncheons, Father-son banquets, arranging for speakers on social issues, Bible studies, etc, etc, etc. Melodies Dahlinger was our president.

"Quoting Pastor Flak from his year-end report, "I don't know what the future will bring-all I know is that we will walk together in the faith that God is beside us, guiding us along new paths and ever new beginnings."

Will Gritter was elected to serve as Council resident for a second term. Newly elected members were Emile Emmel, Gene Darling, Thomas Reinecke and Marianne Wilson.

Will Gritter wrote in his report that 1978 can be seen as a time in which we tried among other things, to be a caring people of God.

Over 40 people attended our "Soup, Salad, and Scholar". This was Dr. Goese's series on "Theology of the Cross vs. theology of Glory".

Evangelism Chairman, Elaine finger, wrote that the committee visited inactive and active members as well as prospective members. New member packets, including keys to the church, were handed out to 31 new members.

Yes, we had a volleyball team. Judy and Tom Reinecke were in charge and the team won the league championship.

Sammie Allen was responsible for the "profiles" of new members in the church "Link" each month.

This was the year we purchased 125 new green hymnals, the "Lutheran Book of Worship". Many members gave hymnals in honor of or in memory of friends and loved ones. We started using them the first Sunday in Advent.

The Men's Club was active as well. Mick Anderson wrote that the meetings were of a very relaxed type and the discussions were on a variety of subjects (no change there). The men did serve Easter breakfast and this year they served soup and sandwiches at the Country Faire held at our church in December. Monies were given towards the purchase of tables.

Terry Finger served as president of Faith Lutheran youth. Fun time was a trip to San Francisco for dinner, a snow trip and a Valentine Dance. Activities included an Encounter Group dealing with drugs and alcohol led by Diane Warner, visiting the ladies at Sonoma State Hospital, a car wash and fixing up the nursery. Grant Doering, Val Peterson and the Proknows were sponsors.

#### Historian's Note:

In reading over the report of the Lutheran Church Women written by Melodie Dahlinger, President, I had forgotten the love, sharing, support, activities, learning and good times we had. Is it possible to live it again?

1979 began with Chuck Hammond being elected President of the Church Council. Chuck was to serve on Council for many years and as we go into the 21st century, he is still among the leaders of Faith Church. Newly elected councilmen were Val Peterson, Debra Hammond, Gordon Stedman, and Eileen Flater. Bob Bell and Betty Freeman have been serving as Treasurer and Financial Secretary, respectively.

Pastor Flak writes in his report for the annual meeting, "We have many people working together to carry out the various functions of the Body of Christ within the congregation. We have a pastor, worship assistants, acolytes, ushers, altar guild, choir members, musicians, teachers, organizers, typers, staplers, mimeographers, folders, filers, cleaners, counters, checkbook writers, attendance takers, people who sing, people who pray and worship, people who give up their time, abilities and their money. It takes all of this for the Body of Christ to function at 4930 Newanga". (Twenty years later, in this computer age, things haven't changed much.)

It was a busy year for the Women of Faith. There were three circles that met monthly and four general meetings at which outside speakers were invited. For several past years (and years to come) they provided tray favors and goodies monthly to the patients at Santa Rosa Convalescent Home. Cecilia Procknow was Christian Action Chairman. 

We honored new members with a flower when they joined, a membership packet, and a get acquainted pot luck dinner. New members were truly welcomed into the Family of Faith.

Randy and Beth Finger joined Faith Lutheran Youth as advisors along with Grant Doering. President Debbie Hammond led the Faith youth with their many activities, car washes, pie sales, harvesting of walnuts [when we had walnut trees on the church property]. This made it possible to earn money needed for their beach parties, swim parties, ski trips [great fun at the Bell's cabin] plus other activities.

On the serious side, there were duties at church. Community service included caroling for shut-ins, and visiting convalescent hospitals. This year the youth group was divided into grades 7-9 and 10 through junior college level for activities.

No stewardship fund raiser was hired. We knew we had a responsibility when we joined our church. We even exceeded our Benevolence goal. Yes, 1980 was good to us...

After looking at the pictures in the year book, we realized that we were having a good time at the Valentine, Mardi Gras Party, dancing our little hearts out. Eldon Flater and Terry Larson were part of the band that kept our toes tapping. Elaine Finger was the chairman.

In March we received a letter from The Reverend Stanley Olson, President of the Pacific Southwest Synod. He wrote, "I've just been reading over your annual report, and it is beautiful to read, one which is positive from first to last. It is obvious that you and your people both enjoy that special quality of being the Body of Christ that is yours in Santa Rosa. A positive spirit of witness is evident in each page. Your music and sense of being Christ's Body is wonderful. Just this note to say it is good to know that Faith Church has such a positive image of itself and responsibility to be Christ's people there."

This was also the first year we had a paid support position. We hired a part-time secretary to handle the work load in the office. (When I think of that of mimeograph machine Mildred Linden and I used —it was nightmare time.).

In reporting Church activities, I have been remiss in not mentioning the Men's Club. For several years they have prepared Easter morning pancake breakfast for all of us to enjoy. Besides solving the world's problems over an informal polluck dinner, they accomplished much more from behind the scenes, helping Eldon Flater with our much needed picnic tables, fire proofing Christmas trees, providing soup and sandwiches at our Country Faire, giving scholarships, buying chairs and tables for all of us to use, — just some of their good works. "Thank you guys".

Our "Soup, Salad, and Scholar" programs were a fine source of Adult Christian Education. One our guest speakers was Dr. Tolvo Harjumpaa, a former Interim pastor for us.

Llly Greer led the LCW for a second year. It was a travel year as Valerie Larson (Zanotto) reported on her trip around the world. Al Mansoor showed slides and artifacts from his native Egypt and The Rev. Luther and Ruth Knock told about their trip to the British Isles and Omerammergau, while showing slides. Kathy Philips was chairman of the successful Mother-Daughter Brunch. Janet Hammond arranged for the girls from the California School for the Deaf to provide the program. Donna Besser and Shirley Williams had charge of the food and Blythe Babb donated many potted plants for the occasion.

Elleen Flater and Emilie Emmel were cochairmen of the September Fun and Festival, which consisted of games and music and a white elephant table. A special children's area was set up ;for games and prizes.

The youth group started the year with a pot luck for their parents. During the Fall they held three fund raisers which included a car wash, a slave sale and cookie sale to provide money for a Christmas Party for children at the dependent unit. It was not all work as there were fun activities too. Craig Hammond was President.

For the old oldies, remember the colles klosk we used to have? Good idea, but awkward to handle.

Once again the year ended with the young people giving their program. Cindy Anderson narrated and the "heavenly angels" sang their hearts out to the delight of the congregation.

(Applause for these people that have served in this capacity for the last several years.) Aiso serving on our council were Grace Forrest, Grant Doering, Eileen Flater, Randy Finger, Diane Warner, Paul Erickson, Val Peterson, Debbie Hammond and Greg Philips."

This is also the year that we celebrated Our 20th anniversary. More on this later.



# CONGREGATIONAL HISTORY 21ST CENTI IRV HERE WE COME

#### 1983

Faith Lutheran Church Council added a feminine look with Grace Forrest as our President. Our list of new Councilmen included Mike Smedshammer, Jan Goree and John Mauro.

Before we continue with the report of our church history, it is with great sadness that on Sunday March 27th we learned of the death of Debra (Debbie) Lee Hammond. Debbie was just twenty years old when she died in an automobile accident. Debbie served on the Sunday Church School, Vacation Church School Staff, was President of the Faith Lutheran Youth, and Youth representative to Church Council. Pastor Flak wrote, "We thank God for this life, lived in our midst for these short years". Yes you have been missed, Debbie.

The Building Committee continued to talk with experts (free of charge), took field trips to other worship facilities to gather information. Milt Hallett, provided to us by The Lutheran Church in America, was most helpful. He advised us to build a facility not only to serve our present needs, but also for the future. Recommended by the Committee, Milt Hallett was engaged to advise the congregation to help accomplish these objectives.

The reason is that the organ has been a little "difficult" lately, difficult to play and difficult to listen to. In October we took delivery of an Allen Organ from St. Luke's Lutheran of Santa Rosa. The cost was \$22,000. This purchase was made after much traveling, searching, studying and playing various organs. Another job well done.

Our communion ware was stolen in the Spring and was replaced by a simple and stately pewter set.

Bob Anderson organized the Usher Team.

The Men's Club, under the direction of Al Parson (if there was a direction) had a good year of fellowship. It wasn't all play though. The annual Easter Breakfast is a tradition now. They help prepare and serve the brunch for the women. Then there was the yard sale. With help from matching funds from the Lutheran Brotherhood, they were able to give \$250.00 to each of the following graduating seniors: Rob Anderson, Heidi Keith, Jeremy Molno, Mike Smedshammer, and Lisa Wilkening.

There was no report from the Youth Group, but after reading Jodi Gritter's treasurers report we know they had a busy year earning money from barn / yard / garage sale and Country Fair. They had a hunger fast so they would know how it felt to be hungry. They participated in Hullabaloo which involved other church youth. They participated in and with plances for the disabled. From personal experience I know they enjoyed their ski trip, even though there was a severe snow storm. Only one day of skiing, but lots of snow play and snowball fights at the cabin. Later, while vacuuming the shag rug, I found lots of pennies. I know some of them had their green visors on. I also discovered that many of them did not know what "Go to sleep" meant. 

1984

The church year started out with a bang and continued throughout the year. To quote Pastor Flak's report, "We began 1984 with more than a little fear and trepidation when we adopted our Church Building Proposal on January 8, 1984, and then moved immediately into a Stewardship Program led by Mr. Wilbur Mancke, which began on January 9, 1984".

Casey D'Angelo was elected President of the Congregation. It was during Casey's leadership that the Congregation adopted the; Church Building Program, retained an architect, Jack Ross, and appointed the church Building Committee Those appointed were: Robert C. Bell, Jr., Jean Flak, Howard Finger, Eldon Flater, Janet Hammond, Will Gritter, and Dan Jensen. [Note: Jensen resigned after moving to Napa.] Dr. Bell served as chairman and Jean Flak as secretary. In August, the congregation approved the schematic drawings of the site plan, elevation, and floor plan.

We were a busy congregation, two snow trips with youth, a "St. Patrick's Day Fun and Fellowship". Beautiful notes were heard from the Faith Chamber Players which included Dave Breninger on recorder; Kathy Franchetti, flute; The Reverend Luther Knock, cello; Ruth Knock, piano; Jan Paine, clarinet and Betty Van Noy, double bass.

The women held a retreat at Bell's cabin. Joan Giordano was the leader. Her topic was "Stress, You Deserve a Break Today". We even did some cross country skiing, which can be stressful for some.

The Men's Club provided the Easter Morning breakfast and with monies earned provided scholarships for our youth.

Our new-used organ was dedicated May 20th. Randall Hoffman, Val Peterson and Faith Parson gave a recital. The choir also presented an anthem, accompanied by the organ.

Diane Warner wore many hats, including Christian Ed. Leader, Youth Director, Choir and Folk Group Leader. Through her leadership many of our programs grew.

Three of our faithful members died, Edith De Lope, a German writer, who wrote supernatural stories, Hugh Onstot, a faithful usher here for many years and The Reverend Art Alm, who came to Faith Lutheran upon his retirement from southern California.

In August the call went out to "Give Us a Hand". The last remaining shed/hen house had to be torn down prior the construction of our new sanctuary. But first we had a "Barn, Yard and Garage Sale", organized by the Men's Club with monies going toward the Scholarship Fund.

Word came that former Pastor Elvin S, Hansen died August 21, 1984 in Irvine, California. Pastor Hansen served Faith from June 1965 to January, 1970

Schematic plans for the new Sanctuary were approved in mid August. The plans came to the floor at a special meeting with recommendations form the Building Committee and the Church Council. The results of the voting by secret ballot were:

In September, our Congregational President, Casey D'Angelo moved to England for a year. He had been awarded a Fulbright Scholarship. It was reported that Mrs. Ruth Bell had been elevated from post of vice-president to President. Will Gritter was elected vice-president.

Communion is now being served twice a month, on the first and third Sundays. Judy Bello is Chairman of the Altar Committee which has 14 members.

Our third "Soup, Salad, and Scholar Night" was led by Rabbi Jonathan Slater, who served Temple Beth Ami, and spoke on Jeremiah.

A "Task Force on Existing Facility Use" was appointed by the Church Council. Rob Dunwoody, Lyle Howe, Nadine Smedshammer, Val Peterson and Laurie Urbais were appointed. Working under the direction of this committee was a kitchen subcommittee with Kathy Phillips, Lily Greer, Gene Darling, and Esther Christensen which was to design a larger kitchen facility

Marianne Burns served as President of the Lutheran Church Women. Two day time circles and one night time circle met monthly. Four General meetings with guest speakers were held. Ten of our ladies attended the L. C. W. Convention at Asilomar.

Gary Wilkening was chairman of the Social Ministry Committee. Through our giving fourteen organizations were helped.

All was not fun and games for our youth this year. They promoted chili dinners and programs plus a sale table at the Barn, Yard, and Garage sale to earn monies to attend Rally '84 in San Diego. They held a welcome rally and a Bible study each month.

To celebrate Advent, Cec Procknow organized an Advent Pot Luck Dinner. Families gathered to share dinner and make Advent Logs and Advent Wreaths to be used in their homes with Advent Devotional Booklets which Cec designed and prepared.

Sunday School ended the year with their family Christmas Celebration.



1985

This was the year of many changes and celebrations. Despite the turmoil of building a new larger sanctuary on our property and personnel changes, we continue to grow in membership.

Diane Warner resigned as Director of Christian Education, however she remained as our Choir Director. In August Janet Hammond assumed that vacated position. Randall Hoffman became our first paid organist. Paul and Mary Rydquist resigned as janitors and Judy and David Brainard replaced them in November. (note—these were paid positions). Dr. Robert Bell resigned as treasurer in December and was replaced by Don Lee.

Our council for 1985 elected Ruth Bell as president. There was some minor disagreements and the meetings were filled with discussions, such as AIDS and the common cup. At that time no one knew with certainty how AIDS was spread so the use of the common cup was discontinued. The effects of cigarette smoke were well known so President Bell asked that no one smoke in the meeting room. When her request was ignored, she brought an electric air filter to the meetings. Pastor Flak was heard to say, "Don't point that thing at me". Eventually common sense prevailed and the smokers graciously went outside to light up; and most eventually quit smoking

So much went on this year, that it is difficult to know where to start. Ruth and Bob Bell had a fire in January that destroyed their home and they had to live elsewhere for five months.

The first activity was the youth snow trip. There was lots and lots of snow at the Bell's cabin and good skiing at Sugar Bowl. and Boreal. In February, The Finger's and their committee sponsored a Hawaiian Luau Fellowship. Terry Larson and Eldon Flater were part of the group, "Homemade Jam", that provided music for our dancing and listening pleasure.

This year, Ed DeLope followed his wife in death. He was a sailor, a gardener, a collector of sheet music and books, and a writer of love/fantasy stories.



Christmas season was celebrated with an Advent program and the making of advent logs and wreaths. Sunday School put on a program led by Lucille Smith (Mandel).




As November arrives, so does elections and we hosted a "Candidate's Night". Jean

#### 1989

Chuck Hammond continues to serve as President of the congregation at Faith. Here is part of his year-end report

"This has been a very interesting and busy year at Faith. We have seen our rural neighborhood change and be transformed into a non-rural neighborhood. This gives many of us strange and difficult feelings to wrestle with. It provides a sensation of sadness to not be able to look out at the oaks and cattle and yet, it brings joy and excitement to see the newness of it all. New people with new dreams and new joys to be in our neighborhood as they try to capture what we have had these many years. Well, prepare to share a little more because it looks certain that we will be experiencing more growth and sharing behind us. This time at

Faith we will be directly involved by the sale of our back property.

This year we have seen our Sunday Church School attendance reach new heights and then also very nearly a new low. We have seen some very committed people and some not so committed. We purchased a new and beautiful Baldwin grand piano to give us pleasure (Val Peterson, Faith Parson, and Diane Martin served on this committee), and yet we have struggled to reach our commitment to Benevolence. We have new carpet in Charter Hall, thanks to an anonymous giver, and we still need the buildings painted. We voted to give the staff a well deserved salary adjustment by passing a faith budget to do so. I hope we all continue to remember that this is what it's all about, being a part of Faith, having faith, trusting each other, and most of all remembering why each of us is here at Faith."

Continuing on, it should be mentioned that the 5th and 6th grade youth made \$350.00 with its recycling program. Some of the money went to a nine year old burn victim. They also helped support Life Savers, an organization led by former baseball pitcher Dave Dravecky, plus giving \$100.00 to the children of Watsonville affected by the October earthquake. (Remember this

was the year of the catastrophic earthquake that hit the Bay Area.

Bob Anderson writes that the Men's Club continues to solve all the worlds problem, the success of this activity is evidenced by the recent changes in Eastern Europe and the rise of

democracy in Central America.

Gordon Stedman continues to serve as treasurer / bookkeeper through the years and the audit committee consisting of Dick Petersen, Don and Jan Lee write that they find the books in excellent order and in accordance with the records of receipts and disbursements.

Two of our members, Dorothy Jaymes and Wes Hammond met death this year. Both found Faith Lutheran late in their lives, and they will be remembered for their dedication to the teaching of the word.

#### 1989 (continued)

In November, the Phoenix Coalition presented "Kristallnacht" to mark the 50th anniversary memorial of Kristalinacht (German) night of crystal, a term coined by the Nazi's themselves after the pogrom of November 9-10. This event was characterized by a great deal of broken glass resulting from vandalism against Jewish houses of worship, cultural institutions and private homes.

There were seven new confirmed youth for 1989. Robert Bertolini. Beth Jensen, Aaron

Knight, Valerie Larson, Chris Rathbun, John Rydquist and Kirstin Snyder.

One of the resolutions made at the annual meeting and given approval was:

Whereas, our mortgage with Lutheran Brotherhood in the original amount of \$276,000 which has a balloon payment due on 11/31/91 in the amount of \$265,884;

And Whereas the congregation would save \$200,000 in interest over the life of the loan;

Therefore, be it resolved that when the proceeds from the completion of the Option Agreement (sale of the back property) are received that Faith Lutheran immediately pay off the mortgage to Lutheran Brotherhood.

Therefore, be it further resolved that the savings be directed toward the life and ministry of

Faith Lutheran. (So be it.)

## Congregational History 1990

Dick Petersen writes, "What a year to have had the privilege of serving as President of the congregation and the Council".

The council appointed a task force to study and develop a job description for additional pastoral staff. This later became known as the Personnel Committee. It wasn't until May that Diane Marten, a Deaconess at Faith, was called to the position of the Associate in Ministry.

Dick reports that the Youth Program has exploded at all levels...(bodies flying in all directions, just kidding Dick). The Youth have been a powerful and rich gift to our congregation. One of their projects was to develop a Youth Garden (later known as The Dream Garden).

The sale of the "back property" went into escrow, which enabled Faith to pay off most of

the mortgage, \$225,000 to Lutheran Brotherhood. Amen.

Vacation Bible School's "Journey's With Jesus", directed by Jean Flak, was a hit. Over 75 children enrolled. Once again, Betty and Ernie Engle hosted "Camp Big Oak" for the young children.

Worship and Music Committee was chaired by Darlene Bayley. Working with her was Jennifer Besser, Altar Guild and Worship Assistant Coordinator. Howard and Elaine Finger made certain ushers were not only present, but also well trained. Sandy Burroughs scheduled the acolytes. Diane Marten was Director of Music and Lily Greer served as Memorial Fund Secretary.

It should be noted that we recognized two people for their services to the congregation at Faith, Cheryl Rydquist for ten years as Church Secretary, and Gordon Stedman for ten years of volunteering his service handling our church finances (thousands of dollars were collected

and spent and never an error).

The Property Committee was kept busy installing, replacing, changing, upgrading, etc. etc. Eldon Flater writes that the committee put in at least 481 hours of labor in 1990. If hired out at

\$20,00 per hour, it would amount to \$9, 620, not including repairs.

Sue Wilkening was President of Faith Women of the ELCA. It was a busy year. Donna Besser headed the cookbook project. Joan Giordano was the leader at their yearly retreat. In September it was the yard sale, in October the convention, and in December the Advent tea. Yes, they still had time for speakers and Bible studies.

The hand of death reached into the family of Faith seven times this year.

Evald Anderson, Pastor Flak was a childhood friend of this family.

Mildred Linden, a member since 1966. She served as a volunteer secretary at our church for a number of years. One of her greatest challenges was the old mimeograph machine we used.

Then, dear friend and Charter member, Ray Allen. He was a gardener/landscaper, an actor, story teller, council member, teacher and a greeter to all.

Jeannette Keay attended Anna Circle and helped prepare our parish newsletter for

mailing. She joined Faith in 1986

Family ties brought Edna Hammond to Faith Lutheran. She was preceded in death by her husband Wes. They had been married for 66½ years. The candlelabras in back of the altar were given in their memory by the family.

We learned by knowing Jerry Anderson. He told us what it was like to discover that you are gay and the fears that go with it. What it was like living with AIDS. Because of his generosity we have the meaningful painting of "Christ on the Cross". which is over 400 years old, in the narthex.


In November, Louise Pucker, mother of Faith Parson, died. Pastor Flak writes, "She

was ready to die and didn't want anyone or anything holding her back".

Our two stained glass windows in the sanctuary were installed and dedicated this December. The Martin Luther window was presented for the Glory of God and in memory of Roy Besser by the Besser Family. The "Creation" window was designed by Faith Parson, Terry Raikes, artisan. Dr. and Mrs. Earl Rathbun were the benefactors.

We celebrated the holiday season with the program, "In Bethlehem Inn". They brought the play down from the stage, right into lap of the audience. The audience became the guests of the Inn on the night that Jesus was born. Beth Finger was the director.

We end 1990 with these figures. Benevolence giving hits a new high: Synod, \$18,192; Hunger, \$2,792; Social Ministry \$3,926; Total, \$24, 910. Average worship attendance January through August -- 155 per Sunday, September through December -- 188 per Sunday

This year our church experienced and increased number of members leaving our congregation for various reasons. Richard Carpenter, Council President, had a challenging year and a busy year with new budget programs, the sale of the back property, new youth programs, a new loan, sharing our facilities with the community, cutting down trees, and planting gardens, plus updating our constitution.

Jean Flak with the help of Chuck Hammond handled the sale of the "back property". \$300,000 was received for the 1.8 acres, a total \$40,000 was paid prior to 1991 and \$260,000 was paid in 1991. Lutheran Brotherhood as holder of the mortgage on our property accepted

\$225,000 of this amount as payment toward our loan.

Richard writes that we provided members and moral support to Thanksgiving Lutheran Church as they grow into a new congregation in Santa Rosa.

Our Church celebrated its 30th anniversary with a special service. Many of the hymns sung were those used during the first year of organization. The Rev. Michael Cooper-White, the Bishop's assistant, gave the sermon.

Original members of the Folk Group still participating, David and Cheryl Rydquist, Terry and

Karen Larson, and Judy Dick sang "Irish Blessing" during the offertory.

Many of the long-time members participated in the church service, Marianne Burns, Don Christensen, Howard Finger, and Chuck Hammond, Sr. Charter members of the choir that are still singing included Faith Parson, Don and Shirley Williams and Lowell Thompson. Lily Greer directed.

A barbecue under the oaks followed the church service. The committee for this latent and Becky Hinkels, Donna Besser, Don and Esther Christensen, Faith Parson, Norma Miller, and Judy Dick.

Member Joan Samuelson continues to make news as she addresses the House Energy and Commerce Health Committee in Washington, D.C. concerning financial aid to the National Institute of Health Research.

Our congregation was saddened by the death of two of our members. David Knight was the husband of Rose Knight, father of Aaron, Sarah, and Daniel. For Howard Forrest pastor Flak wrote, "Howard was one of those people that kindle light within us. He did it with his presence, his example of living with adversity, his gardening, his love of Grace and family, his faith in God, and of course, his gentle smile and humor." (A Liquid Amber tree donated by the Forrest Family has been planted in the Dream Garden as a living memory of Howard.)

that had at least twenty helpers. Pastor Quentin Garman was called to help with the campaign. Our new green paraments were dedicated for our use. Nancy Conway and Bree Seger, who represented the Altar Committee guided the selection after research into fabric, color and design.

A new organist, Marquerite Koster (Crownover) with her gift for music was chosen. Val Peterson, Lily Greer, Faith Parson, and Carolyn Miller served on the search committee to find

an organist, scheduling and listening to them before making their final decision.

After being on the Altar Guild for 30 years, Donna Besser resigned. (That dates her back to when the church started at the Art and Garden Center on Yulupa.) Other Altar Guild members were Nancy Conway, Judy Bello, Lonnee Carpenter, Jan Goree, Blanche Mansoor, Vickie Matreci, Edith Ricker, Bree Seger, and Sue Wilkening. Two new members, Karen Peterson and Rose Knight joined the staff.

#### CONGREGATIONAL HISTORY 21ST CENTURY HERE WE COME THIS IS WHERE WE HAVE BEEN 1992

Here we are starting our 31st year as Faith Evangelical Lutheran Church. Last year was the celebration year. This year was the start of working on the goals that had been set. Richard Carpenter served his second year as president of the congregation. This year was seen as a renewed commitment to youth, the expansion of existing programs for the younger children and the beginning of two new programs, one being led by dedicated members of the "Second Generation", worked on developing new goals and long range plans for the churches needs, including special emphasis on our youth programs. Dick Petersen, Council Vice President submitted their report. (For goals see the 1992 annual report.) The second was the start of "Daytimers" for our "retired youth". This program was led by Esther Christensen.

We continue to share our facilities with the community, although this year Sumerfield Nursery School closed its operations at Faith. A special committee headed by Vickie Matreci looked into the possibility of running a day care school. This was a big step as we discovered in later years. Vickie also chaired the Altar Committee. Their main project was the making of

new Christmas tree omaments to replace the old worn out ones.

Diane Marten writes that Marguerite Crownover completes her first year, a new and very good organist with an old and not so hot organ.

On Maunday Thursday, we joined Bethlehem and Elim for a massed choir singing Rutter's

"Requiem".

Lily Greer continues as the secretary of the Memorial Fund. (And she is still doing it.) This must have been a busy year for Donna Hoberg, Sunday School Superintendent. There were 34 names listed in her report that took part in this years activities. Included, were names of this years confirmands: Kirstand Roland, Danielle Engle, Richard Bertoline, Matt Carpenter and Ken Lantz.

Pastor write, "Death laid a heavy hand on our congregational family this past year by claiming people we were not yet ready to let go of " Richard Sackett, a member since 1971. Dick moved to Santa Rosa when the U.S. Corps of Engineers transferred him to help devision Warm Springs Dam. Long time member, Art Lindberg, a kind and gentile man with high standards and a willing heart. Our blue paraments were given in memory of Art Lindberg by the Lindberg family. Ted Knock, brother of Luther united with us in 1986. He was interested in so many things that surrounded him. Once again we meet death in the newborn Zachary Burns. Carl Wennes, husband of Laurie was a very likable person who because of his illness we did not get a chance to know. Royce Slewing died at the age of 92, a handsome and dignified man. He learned later in his life of his early Lutheran baptism.

"The Women of Faith" met throughout the year under the leadership of Lonnie Carpenter. Gull House at Bodega Bay was the place for a retreat led by Corey Kidwell, using "This Much

and No More" as her topic.

Our youth started the year with several activities until Diane Martin, Associate in Ministry resigned to accept another position. For the seventh and eighth grades, Darlene Bailey and Debbie Ferrunato help carry on so the youth could continue to have fun, look forward to confirmation and doing things such as going to Shalom Camp with the older group. Senior High's held several fund raisers such as pie baking sales, car washes and selling KZST books. With money earned they were able to afford a ski trip, two conventions (one in Monterey and another at Newport Beach) and in their own words, "and one of the most fun places- a beach house in Fort Bragg". Cheryl Rydquist and Rose Knight helped lead the group after Diane left to continue activities, caring and sharing for the youth.

The following is a report of the Call Committee:

"1992 was the year of the CALL. With a mandate from the congregation, assistance from Pastor Flak, the church council and the Bishop's associate, Chuck Ruthroff, the Call Committee followed synodical protocol and direction to interview for and call our Associate Pastor to Faith Lutheran Church. Effective November 29, 1992, James D, Cords was

CALLED to be that person, and was officially installed as Associate Pastor, Sunday December 6, 1992.."

Serving on the Call Committee were Gary Wilkening, Chuck Hammond, Lonnie Carpenter, Grace Forrest, Mariane Screen, Stephanie Darland and Oren Smedshammer, David Rydquist, Chairman.

Our Christmas program, titled "To Bring Our Hearts Together" was organized by Diane Marten. It was a combination program and service that included the children, congregation, clergy and choir. As Donna Hoberg wrote, "a delightful gift of togetherness wrapped in Christmas spirit and sound".

#### 1993

This was the year of changes. President Dick Petersen, and Council members had their work cut out for them. Quoting Dick, "It was a roller coaster year", It was a year of transition caused by Pastor Flak's announcement and subsequent retirement at the end of September.

For the first time we have the full responsibility for our preschool. Prior to the 1992 fall term it was privately run. The school board consists of five church members and two parent members who serve no more than two consecutive terms. The Council appointed David Rydquist, Gordon Stedman, Cecilia Procknow, Tanya Harlin and Vickie Matreci. The operation of the school is the responsibility of Rae Anne Thurlow and Linda Sewell. The school has been self sufficient from the beginning.

We continued our Committee Nights which create ideas, suggestions and recommendations to give to the Council/Congregation. All committees fall into one of these: Outreach, Congregation Care, or Resources.

Death found Ora May Stelling at the Apple Valley Convalescent Home

Shirley (Sammie, as we all knew her) Allen died. She was a Charter member of halftutheran Church and a supporter of all our activities. She loved people and was the #1 welcomer to the church. Best of all she was a hugger

The hunt was on for a pipe organ, led by Marguerite Crownover. Faith Parson, Standard Doering, Lily Greer and Val Peterson. They discovered it took much time to travel, check and listen and learn. Their concern was whether the old organ would hang in there until a new one could be found.

For the seventh year, Betty and Ernie Engle directed Camp Big Oak. The camp was designed to allow those too young to attend our Lutheran Camp at Mount Cross to have a camp out experience with the help of junior counselors.

The Confirmation Class attended "Night Watch" at Grace Cathedral in San Francisco, a youth gathering at Santa Cruz, and a weekend camping trip to Lake Mendocino. That was when Paul Cords fell into the bonfire and mother Marilyn had to rush him to the hospital. Fortunately, all ended well.

A youth subcommittee was formed in the fall to plan some events as well as to communicate some of their feelings with keeping the youth involved in our church. Events from skiing to helping the homeless, attending youth conference in Santa Cruz and hosting a :Captive Free" concert were some that took place.

Bob Anderson, with tongue in cheek reported, "Cloaked in the anonymity of a small church group, The Men's Club continues to influence worldwide politics and policies."

Not all was fun and games for the "Daytimers", With the help of Marilyn Cords they tore sheets into strips and rolled them for use as bandages. These were sent to Madagascar.

Eleven organizations were helped by our giving to Social Ministry. Our largest recipient was the Parkinson's Action Network in the amount of \$1,097.85. All monies given remain locally,

Not all of our members had a chance to know Laura Leigh Schiller. However many gave of their time and money to help maintain a life style she could cope with. She wrote us stories and poetry. We gave support. Laura died May 22.

#### 1993 (continued)

The end of September marked the retirement of Pastor Lorents Flak and his wife Jean. They served us faithfully for over twenty years through tears and laughter. A "Retirement Celebration" was a thank you for those twenty years. A check for \$5,392.23 was presented to them. Serving on the retirement committee were Al and Blanche Mansoor, Chuck and Janet Hammond, Bob and Karen Anderson, Stan and Mary Haller, Nadine and Oren Smedshammer, Faith and Al Parson, Grace Forrest, Donna Hoberg, Diane Marten, Pastor Cords, Paul and Mary Rydquist and Dave and Cheryl Rydquist.

In October, Pastor Richard Heim arrived to be out Interim Pastor and work with Pastor

Cords.

Val Peterson, Financial Secretary, writes in his report ---- "During 1993 the number of members contributing remained essentially unchanged from the previous year. In fact the number of contributors has been almost constant for the last five years. The number of members who pledge varies from year to year, but the total giving is relatively unaffected by this variation. Members who pledged contributed 93% of what they said they would; this is

close to the historical average for Faith Lutheran".

The next paragraphs are copied from the Vision Committee Report for 1993. Those serving on this project were Joan Samuelson Corbet, Grant Doering, Donna Hoberg, Phil Rosen, Chuck Hammond, Sr., and Bob Matreci. "Faith's growth in staff and service, begun with the hiring of Deaconess Diane Marten as Associate in Ministry and continued with call of Pastor Cords as associate Pastor, demonstrated a potential for wider ministry. This development presented a challenge: although some financial growth occurred during the period, church income has not always equaled its expenses. At the outset of the hiring of Diane Marten, the church's savings (from the sale of church property) were required to meet the expenses, but by the time of the end of her tenure as A IM, Faith's income had grown to a point where it met that increased expense. With the further increase in expenses resulting from the call of a second pastor in place of an AIM, however, church expenses exceeded income and eventually the savings were entirely depleted.

Assuming the shortfall can not be met at this time without a substantial increase in giving or membership, Faith cannot address the vision with a action to simply replace Pastor Flak as senior pastor. How will various priorities named be staffed, and by whom?"

His opening statement for the annual report was: "We had a pastor--we had two pastors--we had one pastor--we had no pastor. We called--he came, but he left. Then a warm gentle caring interim pastor (his name was Dr. David Larson) came and guided us through disruption, confusion, hurt, anger, but mostly he guided us in our healing and our spiritual needs. But that was yesterday and now he has returned, with Faith's appreciation, to his retirement".

Serving on Council during the troubled times and having to make tough decisions were Jan Lee, Bob Matreci, Glen Crownover, Eldon Flater, Carolyn Miller, Bruce Kyse, Tim Nelson,

Donna Hoberg, Emie Engle, Jody Fairfield and youth representative Phil Rosen.

Spaghetti dinners, "Faith Follies" a talent show, and ice cream social helped raise funds to send our youth and chaperones to Mexico for the Servant Project (helping to build homes) which was quoted as being awesome, and a blast and which had a very powerful and lasting impact on all who went.

It was a busy year for youth as they hosted two "Captive Free" concerts, show trips, night watch, VBC, annual beach trip to Fort Bragg which was very spiritual, Youth Encounters in Santa Cruz, Shalom Camp, and the Kids to Kids Party for the homeless shelter families as well as the occasional skating party.

Pam D'Angelo reported that the annual women's retreat, focusing on "Faith in Daily Life" took place in March at Bodega Bay. Eighteen women participated. The retreat was led by The Rev. Susan Nachtigal.

Faith Lutheran preschool hosted a Mother's Day Tea. Vickie Matreci was in charge was a time for women to wear their spring finery and bring a fancy cup.

Not to be left out, the men of Faith held a retreat at the D'Angelo family home in Carmet using the thems, " Living out Faith in Everyday Life", led by Pastor Rubin Aga.

This was a special year for Eldon and Elleen Flater, and Gora and Gene Dahing as their celebrated their Fiftieth Wedding Anniversaries with us.

Bob Matreci and Joanne Lantz reported on the Sunday School, Day Camp, and Vacation Bible School. It was all there, Opening Pow Wow, Christmas choir, rehearsals, lessons,

singing, rap sessions, crafts, and mission impossible challenges.

In August the organ search committee found a used Moeller pipe organ with 10 ranks of pipes, complete for \$33,184.00. The church council accepted the recommendation to purchase this instrument with donations, honorariums and memorials. A vote was passed by the congregation to apply for an add-on loan, in the amount of \$50,000 from the Lutheran Brotherhood to provide funds for the addition to the church (to create an area for the pipes), rerouting the church, Charter Hall and Humman Hall.

In September, more than 100 folk gathered for an Aloha Luau under the oaks to say goodbye to the Cords family: Jim, Marilyn, Kristin and Paul. There even was a Luau pig that the Hammond family got and prepared for the occasion. Jamie Hammond and Jan Lee organized this special tribute for the family. We cared a lot about them and are grateful to have known them.

One of the many things Pastor Cords accomplished was the starting of the Wednesday Bible Class.

With sadness, we said our good-byes to Lowell Thompson who died in November. Lowell was a psychologist for forty years in the Piner-Olivet School System. He and his wife, Ruth, shared their musical talents and participated in activities of the church.

This was a busy year for the Personnel Committee. Prior to Pastor Chords leaving, long time parishioner and church secretary, Cheryl Rydquist retired. A good-bye party with gifts was given for her. Before that Diane Marten, Director of Music, transferred to Thanksgiving

Lutheran, and prior to that, Interim Pastor, Richard Heim retired to Colorado Springs. Yes it definitey was a busy year for the Personnel and Call Committees.

The coming of Pastor Graig Geiger to Faith Lutheran Church on January 1, 1995 will be cause for celebration. We look forward to a new year, a new pastor and a new beginning.



1995

Coordinator for the "Daytimers", Esther Christensen reported that they made tray favors for five different residential care homes. In the Fall they made Christmon omaments for our Christmas Tree. It was a time for good conversations, sightseeing, games and lunch.

In May eleven FLC Women attended a retreat at Carmel led by the Rev. Susan Nachtigal. Upon passing licensing requirements by the State of California, Faith Lutheran Preschool opened its doors in September of 1993. The school was started as part of Mission Outreach Program. Our church members have continued their involvement, through staff, board, teachers and students.

Lily Greer continues as Memorial Fund/Book Chairman. She reported that a large amount of money was donated to the Organ Fund in memory of loved ones. As members we certainly appreciate that giving.

Cathy Martin, Junior High Director, reported that the class made a quilt for the homeless people after hearing a guest speak on Homeless Services.

We thank the Men's Club for the new round tables and chairs they provided through the

efforts of their world famous Easter Morning Breakfast Fund Raiser.

The organ committee that was formed in 1991 was successful in finding two compatible organs at Danville and Piedmont. Jeanine Dahlquist, chairwoman, reports that we will end up with a 10 rank Moeller organ and they heard that we have the best organ north of the bridge. Amen. One of the fund raisers for the organ was held on a hot, hot summer day when we had a "Hoe-Down Party" Pastor Craig had the coolest job behind the wet sponge toss.

In April funeral services were held for Ray Thomas Allen at Faith. He was the son of Ray

and Sammie Allen and brother of Blythe Babb.

Ray King, a skillful and talented man of many trades died May 3rd. King suffered nine major strokes in the years after his wife died. He was 87 years old.

An open house to celebrate Roger and Lorraine Larson's 50th Wedding Anniversary was a

happy occasion.

A record 34 excited children covering preschool through 2nd grade attended the Vacation Bible School. "Living In God's Creation", was put together by staff under the direction of Vickie Matrici.

There were seven young people confirmed by Pastor. They were Brian Carpenter, Justin


Ferronato, David Knight, Brandon Kyse, Anna Martin and Garrett Procknow.

1996 was a year of steady progress, a year of celebration (we always seem to have something to celebrate). This year was the addition of a fine pipe organ. Thanks to the organ committee who found it. Ruth Bell took the console apart to refinish it and Terry and Dave Williams applied the stain and finish. Ruth Bell put it back together, minus the innards. Phil Browning with the help of Bob Bell installed the organ into the area that was constructed to house the pipes. Glen Crownover was there to help when it was time to put in the blower and did some wiring. More on this later.

Casey D'Angelo was elected for a second term as president of the congregation. A council retreat in January gave them a chance to know each other and make some decisions. They came up with eight areas that were felt to be important, youth support, social activities, new member support, welcoming at Sunday service, school marketing, sharing who we are, clear

Worship and music began to tackle the difficult task of copyright compliance for the music they use. Joanne Lantz headed the committee to survey our copy right needs and paying royalties. We hardly ever hear about the Staff Support Committee. It was formed last year. Its responsibility is to support the church staff and the entire congregation as a communication network, a liaison to forward concerns, questions, and challenges to the person of communication that a resolution may be achieved. The committee members were: Dick Peterser. chairman, Mary Haller, Jamie Hammond, Kim Olney, Larry Zech, and Al Mansoor

After receiving input from the congregation, the Social Ministry Committee header in the Martin decided to focus their attention on just three organizations that the church can net year, "Homeless Service Center", "Parkinson's Action Network", and YWCA Women's Sheries were selected. The "Deacon's Fund was reactivated. The Youth Group had existing monies of \$331'98 (from recycled cans) that went to the "Sunburst Project).

Each week our church hosted four AA groups, one Al-Anon group and a meditation group. Each month we were host to an AA general meeting, Step Families Association, P-Flag. Intermittently we hosted Moonlight Quilters, Piano Recitals and Election Polls. Donna Hoberg

has served as liaison / coordinator for these groups.

There was no chairman for the Property Committee, but from the annual report that Bob Bell wrote there were at least nineteen (large and small) projects accomplished throughout the year; storage space for choir robes and music, painting, adopt a space to care for, Heritage Grove tree planting, and lath house renovation. The Dream Garden continues to be a place of beauty for solitude, prayer, and meditation.

In August twelve FLC youth and five adults traveled to Tiajuana, Mexico with the goal to build a house for a poor family. They found the work was backbreaking, under the hot sun but they did complete an 11' x 22' house. A guide from Amar Ministries said it was the best looking

house she had seen all summer.

A library committee was formed and plans were made to establish a library in the conference room. Additional shelves were built and the committee sanded and stained them. The congregation was asked to donate books for the library and for a book sale to raise funds. We responded with many boxes and stacks of interesting books. The committee consisted of Cathy Martin, Joanne Lantz, and Donna Hoberg. Donna Besser was named official Librarian.

There were three members who died in '96, Ruth Elaine Azoff, Charter member Esther Kjeldgardwho served Faith well, and Mildred Smith who gave much of her time as a volunteer worker through Welfare League.

The Pipe Organ Committee could finally see closure as we celebrated on March 30th an organ debut. This was a dress up occasion starting with an Organ Recital led by Marguerite Crownover and Val Peterson. A champagne reception followed. An English Tea Room was set up in Charter Hall and dancing to a live band was held in Hummon Hall. Out door mini lights decorated the way between buildings. This was certainly a special night for all. Those who served on the Organ Celebration Committee Janine Dahlquist, chairman, Cora Darling, Jamie Hammond, Janet Hammond, Nancy Yamasaki, Jodi Fairfield, Darlene Nelson, Marguerite Crowenover, Carolyn Miller, Mary Anne Screen, and Faith Parson, advisor.

Pastor and Ruth Knock showed us that life could be beautiful after 60 years of marriage.


Bob and Ruth Bell celebrated their 50th. Where did all that time go?

#### CONGREGATIONAL HISTORY 1997 21st CENTURY HERE WE COME THIS IS WHERE WE HAVE BEEN



This year's history begins using the Pastor's Report as printed in our Annual Report. Pastor Geiger wrote, "As we began the year with a reduced council membership, there was a sense that some change was in the wind. At the '97 council retreat some keen scrutinizing was undertaken of the council's and the congregation's wants, needs, and goals and perceptions Some inconsistencies were unearthed as to my perceptions and the congregation's understanding as to what model of ministry best meets the needs of Faith Lutheran Parish. I believe that the shift in how we work together was healthy and fruitful. The council set about offering a series of congregational vision meeting with the theme being, "Welcoming the Stranger'."

Serving on the 1997 council were Donna Besser, Tina Garner, Chuck Hammond, Sr., Glenn Hetchler, Joanne Lantz, Karen Anderson, and Sandi McCracken. Wayne Henkle was elected

by council to serve as president of the congregation.

Many members and friends donated monies to fund our "Heritage Grove" to honor past present and future "saints" Ruth Bell planned and organized the planting of the trees along the property fences with the help of the Property Committee. In addition to digging holes to plant the trees, the property committee painted the exterior of the church buildings. A new roof was place on the Sanctuary. Portions of the wooden exterior that had developed dry rot were also replaced, as well as windows in the office.

For many years Terry Larson with wife Karen faithfully played and led the contempo group in the service. When they resigned, Michael Heintz was hired to lead the group.

Some of us had a chance to know Rosita (Rose) White before she died. She would come to Care and Share meetings and Sunday church services with her husband Bob.


Daniel, husband of Monica Thompson, was a name on our prayer list that as time passed we got to know and pray for with Monica.


And so we end these reports of years past. I probably enjoyed it the most as I reminisced over the happenings of those years, smiles, tears, remembrances lost, new ones gained.






